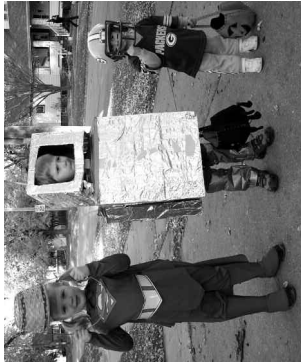

While winter snow certainly is beautiful this time of year, keeping it cleared off of driveways, sidewalks and roads does create challenges for both our community and residents. Following a few simple guidelines can help keep our neighborhood safer, pedestrian friendly, and prevent costly citations. Here are some important points to keep in mind whenever we have snow:

Whenever snow falls and sticks to the roadway, the Dept. of Public Works (DPW) deploys trucks to plow and salt primary streets and bus routes. If snow accumulation exceeds two (2) inches, then DPW plows all streets in the City. NOTE: The "snow accumulation" term used above refers to the **depth of snow on the street.** It is not the official snowfall reported by the National Weather Service. Accumulation on the street can be less than the official snowfall because pavement temperatures can be higher than ground temperatures. Snow tends to consolidate on pavement. So it typically takes more than two than two (2) inches of National Weather Service snow to equal two (2) inches of roadway/plowable snow.

Parking on all City streets during snow emergencies is prohibited. Please listen to your local news telecast or radio programming for information during heavy snow conditions. Snow emergencies are declared under widely varying conditions; there is no hard and fast rule. When a snow emergency is declared, all media are notified approximately six (6) hours prior to the beginning of the event. During a snow emergency, all streets must remain free of

parked vehicles until plowed. If a snow emergency is still in effect BUT your street has been plowed, you may park your vehicle back on the road without penalty. Parking on all City streets is prohibited between 3 AM and 5 AM daily, year-round.

City ordinance 9.30(I) requires that residents remove snow from their sidewalks within 24 hours after a snowfall. If a violation is reported, the City will remove the snow and the resident (or owner) will be billed. To report a sidewalk which hasn't been shoveled, call 448-3535 Mon - Fri, 8 am to 4:30 pm.

Do not use de-icing agents (salt or chemical) if at all possible. They degrade the pavement and are harmful to the environment. If you must use them, clean as much snow from the pavement first. Then use only as much de-icing agent as necessary to cause melting action. Placing a lot of de-icing agent down all at once does not speed the melting process. Give it time to work. Then add more if necessary. Salt is very ineffective at pavement temperatures below 10 to 15 degrees Fahrenheit.

Placing garbage cans and/or recycling bins on snow banks is prohibited. Residents must place these containers on a flat surface or shoveled-out area.

Holidays impact waste collection schedules. Finally, keep in mind that when the City is closed for a holiday, garbage and recycling collection is delayed by one day in that holiday week. So if your normal garbage day is Friday, the weeks of Christmas Day and New Year's Day it will be delayed until Saturday.

LUMINARIES: AN ASTOR NEIGHBORHOOD TRADITION

December is a time for family and tradition. Please join our neighborhood in participating in the Astor's tradition of displaying luminaries every Saturday night in December and Christmas Eve. Don't know how? Luminaries can be as simple as a brown paper bag filled with a little sand or kitty litter and votive candle. Target is now selling battery powered luminary lights. There was an ice luminary display on Jackson that was quite beautiful.

Every winter a variety of issues come up regarding snow plowing in Green Bay. This is a summary of our snow plowing operations.

Green Bay has approximately 500 miles of streets to be plowed. About 115 of those miles are primary streets and bus routes. Whenever a snowfall sticks to the pavement, all primary streets and bus routes are plowed and salted. If the snow accumulation exceeds 2 inches, all streets in the city are plowed. Side streets are not salted, with the exception of hills and intersections where a sand and salt mixture is used.

Last winter a beet juice and salt mixture was tried. This has been used successfully in other cities and we experienced good results. (This is not the beet juice you are familiar with

from a can of beets. This is a commercial form which doesn't stain.) Mixing the salt with beet juice allows us to use about 25% less salt and this mixture works better than just salt in colder temperatures.

Every other time the city plows, the routes are reversed so that if you are on the end of the route for a plowing operation you will be on the beginning the next time.

There are exceptions to these guidelines. The frequency of snowfalls, the heaviness of the snow and different temperatures may dictate more or less frequent plowing.
