The City of Green Bay's website also has numerous resources available for those living in the area. The City of Green Bay's police department also has a new police call mapping website located at www.myneighborhoodupdate.net. Introduced to the neighborhood associations at the November 5th Green Bay's Neighborhood Leadership Council meeting (recently renamed from the Mayor's Neighborhood Leadership Council), this resource allows citizens access to police calls for service within a day or two of the incident. While using the site, it is easy to access information about a specific city, street, or neighborhood. Users may also select the categories of incident types including noise, disorder, proactive policing, property, violent, traffic, and other types of police calls. Monthly trends, the most significant events in the area, and email alerts are also available. It is a great site that allows neighbors to understand what is happening in their area as well as allows police officers to spend more time in areas with more problems.

While all of these services are online, those without internet at home can still access them. The Brown County Public Library system has computers with free internet access available for use throughout the day -- just by showing a librarian your library card.

With all that said, the ANA board and I wish everyone a safe, happy new year. We look forward to hearing your ideas, questions, and concerns and to work with you to continue to improve the place that we live in.

Calendar of Events

From Christine Dunbar, Brown County Historical Society

Detailed accounts of Christmas celebrations in Green Bay go back as far as the 1820's. Pioneer settler, Elizabeth Baird's description of Christmas and New Year festivities are documented in her recollections published in the Wisconsin Historical Collections. She noted that the French Canadian Catholics in the community met in each other's homes to pray and sing hymns in the weeks before Christmas. On Christmas Eve the prayers lasted until midnight, and were followed by a reveillon (midnight treat) which was the high feast of the season. Baird described New Years Day as a day for merry making, visiting and gift giving.

Albert Ellis, an early resident of Green Bay recalled a Christmas dinner and ball in 1824, given by Col. Mc Neil, the commanding officer of Fort Howard. Invitations were sent to the entire population. Ellis recalled "the table was spread the length of the room and plates laid for a hundred guests. He described costumes that ranged from Parisian gowns to buckskins and moccasins. Ellis reported dishes of venison, bear, porcupine, geese, ducks and an almost endless list of fish. The dinner was finished at 6:00 and dancing began soon after and lasted until the small hours of the night".

Henry Baird is credited with establishing the custom of holding a New Year's Day Open House.

Started in the 1830's the custom lasted until about 1885 and gave a unique quality to the Green Bay social scene. Open houses reached such proportions that the newspapers carried lists of locations and hostesses. Henry Baird had 150 callers to ring in 1872. As the city grew and public places became available for yuletide celebrations the custom of celebrating in private homes lost favor. Social clubs, hotels, and places such as Klaus Hall and Turner Hall held Christmas and New Year Balls.

The Green Bay Advocate of Dec 24, 1869 mentioned upcoming activities at Turner Hall including a German concert of operatic music to be followed by a raffle. On Dec 31, 1869 the Advocate described the raffle in the following way. "A Christmas tree filled with trinkets and articles of value was raffled by numbered tickets. The fun lie the way fortune distributed the prizes; cigars to children, a doll baby to a bachelor and a keg of beer to a child."

The Wisconsin Democrat, the Green Bay Advocate and the Green Bay State Gazette detailed the holiday celebrations in Green Bay throughout much of the 19th Century. Sleighing, ice skating, the ability to cross the river, and the growing popularity of Christmas trees in the community can be followed. The next time you visit the Brown County Library take a few minutes to explore our holiday traditions.

Are you looking for a quality preschool program for your child right here in our neighborhood? Did you know that one of our neighbors, Mayflower Nursery School, was the first preschool in the Green Bay area?

Mayflower was also the first interdenominational school in the state of Wisconsin. The school was founded in 1955 and is located in the basement level on the campus of Union Congregational Church at 716 South Madison.

Mayflower is a non-profit organization run by a parent volunteer board. Many of Mayflower's alumni have chosen to send their children to Mayflower. The preschool has been the educational foundation for more than 1,500 children and looks forward to a long future.

There are many opportunities for your family in the Green Bay area in the winter. City and county facilities provide for both indoor and outdoor activities.

Have you been to the Museum lately? Check www.nevillepublicmuseum.org for hours and current displays. Admission is free Thursdays 6pm to 8pm. The Brown County Library has many resources for your enjoyment on a cold winter day.

Triangle Hill has tubing and skiing/snowboarding hills along with cross country skiing and a warming

building. Mayflower is comprised of two class groups and both are lead by teams of two teachers. The Bunny Class includes 3 and 4 year old children who meet three mornings per week from 9:30 – Noon. The Duck Class includes 4 and 5 year old children and they meet four mornings a week from 9:30 – Noon.
