The county 0.5% "stadium" sales tax, which was voted in a referendum and enacted in 2000, has concluded after almost 15 years. Though the fiscal impact on our citizenry varied according to their purchases during this time (\$100 on a \$20,000 car or 5 cents on a \$10 toy car), the positive impact of this investment on our community has been substantial. The money from this sales tax paid for a little over half of the atrium, added seats, and other renovations in the 2003 construction project. Since then, there have been continued growth, changes, and renovations in and around the Lambeau facility, including the Hall of Fame, restaurants, pro-shop, and more - from other investors, bonding, and team stock sales, but not our county sales tax.

Initial estimates for the duration of the tax were not met due to decreased consumer spending and recession; continuing to collect the tax for several months after the costs were reached as well as collecting money to fund continued building maintenance were both consequences of state rules and regulations that were understood, though perhaps not by all, at the onset of the tax. The next step will be determining how the excess collected taxes are utilized or refunded, which will likely fall to individual municipalities within the county.

By the time you are reading this, the county 2016 budget will have been finalized; most of our neighbors will see the county portion of their property tax bill remain steady or decrease slightly from last year. The county budget for 2016 is over a quarter of a billion dollars, with almost a third of that collected from property taxes. Key additions to this year's proposed budget, feasible due to a broader tax base, include investments in mental health, child protective services, the county library system, and economic development.

Police Calls Remain Low on Fox River Trail in Green Bay

The Fox River Trail, which begins in downtown Green Bay and extends some 25 miles south along a former rail corridor, has seen growing popularity over the years. The trail has been a great place for families, walkers, and cyclists. When my colleagues and I patrol the trail on bike we see what a special place it has in our community.



I say this because an incident that occurred on the Fox River Trail this summer on August 7th in the Town of Rockland, does not reflect the status of the whole trail. On August 7th 2015, at 2:00 pm near mile marker 9 (just north of Old Martin Road), Town of Rockland, a 14-year-old boy was attacked in what was believed to be a robbery attempt. The suspect, who was on a motorized pedal bike kicked the teens bike forcing it off the trail and then attempted to steal a set of headphones belonging to the teen victim. The news stories that came out that August 7th day were headlined "Teen Attacked on Fox River Trail" and "Teen Attacked while biking on Fox River Trail." For frequent trail

users, these stories certainly did and should cause alarm or potential apprehension about safety. Those thinking about using the trail may wonder if it is really safe anywhere at all.

In Green Bay however, the calls to the trail have remained low over the years. Since 2011, a total of 19 calls have been dispatched. Total calls since 2011 show four calls that year, nine in 2012, two in 2013, two in 2014 and two so far in 2015 as of September 10th. This year the calls were for a juvenile issue and a 911 hang up. Last year the calls were a welfare check of a citizen and a 911 hang up. The 911 hang up calls did not result in an emergency situation needing police services. In 2013 an ordinance violation and a suspicious person call were reported.

One incident from August should not define how safe a 25 mile stretch of trail is. That being especially true for the portion in Green Bay going through downtown and the Astor Neighborhood. We see every day what a quality, recreational resource the trail is. Yet, the incident serves as a reminder to be vigilant and aware of surroundings when walking or biking in areas more obscure. Wear reflective clothing at night, carry a cell phone, and let someone at home know where you are going. Walk or bike with someone if possible, and report suspicious activity to police.

Have a great fall season and I look forward to seeing you in the neighborhood.

Astor Neighborhood Sign Landscaping by Jim Frisk

On one of the hottest days of the summer in July, you may have noticed the landscaping around our neighborhood sign on Monroe Avenue was updated. For this project, we wanted to make sure that the plants we selected were both historic to the area and drought tolerant. To accomplish this, we engaged Green Bay Nursery to help develop a plan. The plan included plants

such as Shasta Daisy, Russian Sage and Porcupine Grass. To clear out the old overgrowth around the sign and put in the new plants, we got help from some of the boys at Ethan House on Quincy St.

"Ethan House Group Home provides a temporary living arrangement for boys, ages 12-17, who are court-ordered into placement or referred from the county or state due to behavioral, emotional or legal issues." It took us several hours to complete the project and during that time the boys had a nice visit from Mayor Jim Schmitt. We hope you like the new and improved look.



Dear Astor Neighborhood Gardener,

I am very interested in planting some raspberry and blueberry bushes by my house next spring. Do you have any recommendations as to how to plant them, where to plant them, and how to maintain them?

Thanks!

Thank you for the question. I myself am not experienced with blueberry bushes, so I am not able to help you there, but I have had raspberries for nearly 20 years. Wait until the ground has thawed in spring. The first thing you'll want to do is find a place to plant them, in full, or nearly full sun. After you obtain your plants, you will want to dig a roomy hole, fill the hole with water, and then place the roots into the hole. Fill around the plant with the



leftover soil, pressing firmly. Make sure you water it often after planting to ensure that the plant has adequate moisture. Depending on the variety of raspberry, you will need to prune. Good luck to you.
