Our Green Skyline

One could spend countless hours taking the time to observe and appreciate the vast array of beautiful and historic trees in our neighborhood. The trees in the Astor neighborhood are as unique and prominent as the historic homes themselves. The trees stand as a protective canopy, towering over the eaves of our homes and sheltering them from one hundred years of changing seasons. A friend of mine claims that he can stroll the sidewalks of the Astor neighborhood in a summer's downpour without an umbrella and not be hit by a single drop of rain.

These living skyscrapers kindly coexist with our homes, providing for their residents a peaceful urban forest, a retreat from nearby urbanization. That being said, the trees do have a habit of stubbornly reminding us that they were here first: Year round, with exception of the winter months, we find ourselves cleaning up more after them than after a toddler! However, most of us understand that the "tree dirt" comes with the territory. We knew what we were getting into when we moved in.

What many of us may not know is that the trees in our neighborhood are some of the largest and oldest in the entire state! In 1997, the City of and a grant from the State of Wisconsin

Astor Neighborhood's Top 5 Trees:

Green Bay's Parks, Recreation & Forestry Department, in conjunction with Brown County Department of Natural Resources Forestry Program, researched, documented and published an inventory of the County's largest trees. Our neighborhood boasts an impressive forty "Champion Trees", as documented in their report, *Champion Trees of Brown County*. This represents over ten percent of the largest trees of Brown County, found in just the small, fifty square block radius of our neighborhood. Even more impressive is the number of trees in our neighborhood, in our very own front and backyards, which are ranked as the largest of their species in the entire state!

I'd like to highlight our neighborhood's "Top 5". Next time you're out for a leisurely walk, take some time to check out these beauties. Consider it a neighborhood nature walk. I'm no arborist, but I have listed below the measurements, which are a few years old now, as well as the locations of these trees. As always, please be respectful of your neighbors' private property. All of these trees are clearly visible from public access sidewalks.
