This summer has seen many positive changes in our City's neighborhoods. Neighborhood Walks have been implemented in Navarino and Olde North Neighborhoods in order to identify problem areas, troublesome properties and promote the meaning of neighborhood. In an effort to remain pro-active, Astor launched their first Neighborhood Walk on Wednesday, August 26th. Together with our sister neighborhood associations, we can help to bring about positive change desperately needed to accomplish and maintain the livability of our neighborhoods.

With the budget process upon us, we also need to keep in mind the programs that require funding but have no real income to sustain them without our help. Howe Neighborhood Family Resource Center provides many services to families in our neighborhood. They provide many programs and also have many needs. Finally, if you haven't already heard, we are working on a new project for St. James Park. Through the Mayors Neighborhood Leadership Council and Urban Partnership, Astor Neighborhood Association received a \$7,500 Grant for placement of a Victorian pillar clock at the corner of Monroe Avenue and Congress

Street in the southeast corner of St. James Park. The total cost of the clock is \$15,000.

In addition to the financial grant, we were also allowed an additional year above-and-beyond the typical one year required to raise the remaining funds needed to accomplish our goal. This is where we all come in. Through monetary donations, the purchase of a Carolyn Barnard print and original (which can be previewed on our website), and future fund-raising methods, we can make this exciting addition to our Historic Neighborhood happen. Let's get ticking!
