Alderman Tony Theisen Update

St. Vincent Hospital would like to expand their parking ramp westerly across and onto the properties they own on the west side of the 900 block of South Van Buren. Their plan has all entrances on Porlier Street and would remove the one block portion of 900 South Van Buren Street.



The city is interested in the opinions of the neighborhood: all development within the hospital corridor requires plan commission and city council approval. Immediate neighbors will be notified of all meetings.

The Green Bay Comprehensive Plan has the following objective: to develop a parking plan for the downtown hospitals. Tony has initiated this planning process through the plan commission and neighbors of the hospitals have been invited to a May 1, 2003 meeting to develop a plan committee. He believes the city should develop this plan before any significant parking changes are approved.

City Band Concerts

The hour-long concerts begin at 7:30 p.m., for which the ANA will serve the usual popcorn in the park, soda, ice cream, and candy.

On July 4, the band plays next to the Neville Public Museum for the ShopKo Fireworks and Celebrate Americafest, beginning at 8:30 p.m. Another special event is planned for June 16, beginning at 7:30 p.m. at St. James Park. The Baylanders Barbershop Chorus and the Chantelle's Ladies Singers Group are the featured entertainers for the evening.



Are you looking for an opportunity to develop your leadership skills, become educated on issues facing the area, provide community service, and network with other aspiring

leaders? If so, Leadership Green Bay (LGB), an annual program of the Green Bay Area Chamber of Commerce, is for you.

LGB was started in 1983 and since then has been bringing area people together from a variety of backgrounds to participate in monthly educational sessions and community projects. The program begins in September with a two-day retreat and continues through May with participants meeting one day each month. Monthly sessions focus on the area's economy, local history and heritage, diversity and cultural awareness, human services, government, and environment. Through these monthly sessions, participants gain awareness of the community and its needs and opportunities from numerous area leaders. LGB participants also work in small groups throughout the year to develop and implement their own community service projects. One such small group effort resides in the Astor Neighborhood on the Fox River Trail, just south of Porlier Street.

Participants are selected for the program each year through a written application and interview process. Completed applications must be submitted by May 31st to be eligible for the September class. Fee and application details can be found on the Internet at www.titletown.org (click on Leadership Green Bay on the menu option) or by calling Jeanne Agneessens of the Green Bay Area Chamber at (920) 437-8704.

LGB has made a difference in the lives of over 600 graduates. Listen to what a few graduates have to say:

I was aware of many of the non-profit programs that exist in our community, their need for volunteers and leadership, and the unending opportunity to participate. Still, I left Leadership Green Bay with a deeper appreciation of the history of the community, a better understanding of the potential for Green Bay to draw business and industry – as well as individuals, and certainly, better equipped to serve the community. – Mayor Jim Schmitt

Gypsy Moth Round-up

Gypsy moths are extremely invasive and are defoliating most of the oak trees in the area. They are now also eating away other tree species.

An aerial spraying of a bacterial insecticide to minimize the population will occur between mid-May and early June in the morning. The treatment area is Allouez, Ashwaubenon, DePere, Green Bay, Hobart, Howard, Pittsfield, Scott, Suamico, and Wrightstown.

Hazelwood Wisconsin Statehood Celebration

Come stroll Hazelwood's grounds on May 29, from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m., and learn more about Wisconsin Statehood! This event is free to the public and is meant to honor Morgan L. Martin, who was so instrumental in bringing the Wisconsin Territory to Statehood in 1848. Morgan L. Martin and his family resided at Hazelwood for nearly 100 years. He was a territorial representative to the U. S. Congress prior to 1847, at which time he became Chairman of the Wisconsin Constitutional Convention in the new capital city of Madison.

Hazelwood Directors are asking Astor neighbors to fly their U.S. or Wisconsin flags on May 29 in celebration of the 155th anniversary of Wisconsin becoming a state.
