
meet your neighbors and have fun for a few hours. If you would like to help out with the popcorn in the park sales, please contact Roxanne Chronert at 433-9263.

hen Jon Johnson's mother first walked into his newly acquired residence at 924 Emilie Street she paused, glanced around and said

"Hmm ..." Her initial reaction was then followed by a phone call to Jon's sister where she asked, "Do you think they know what they're doing?" Jon is happy to report that his mother now walks in that same front door, glances around and says enthusiastically, "I love this house!" And that, in a nutshell, could best describe the reaction one has when they see the incredible transformation at the home of our neighbors Jon and Terri Johnson.

Natives of Green Bay, but having lived



pring is just around the corner, and that means maintenance and home renovations for some of us. Here are a few reminders about the safety of your family members, your neighbors, and your community.

Lead paint is a highly toxic metal. Children under the age of 6 are at the most risk because their nervous systems are still developing. Adults also risk nervous and reproductive damage. The damage is irreversible, so please lead-safe your home and pick up a copy of Lead Paint Safety: A Field Guide for Painting, Home Maintenance, and Renovation Work from your local home depot or HUD office.

WHY: Lead exposure in young children (including pregnant mothers) can lower IQ's, reduce attention spans, impair growth, cause hearing loss and learning disabilities, among other health and behavioral effects. Lead exposure in adults can cause brain damage, nervous system damage, and reproductive damage.

WHAT: Lead dust is the biggest culprit. In homes and outside in the soil where lead paint is deteriorating and homes where renovations are done without lead-safe practices. Paint and varnish in homes built before 1978 contain lead, so that means our homes contain lead.

HOW: Here is a basic guide for what and what not to do.

NOT ALLOWED

- Power sanders or grinders
- Paint strippers containing Methylene Chloride
- Uncontained hydroblasting
- Uncontrolled abrasive blasting
- Dry scraping or sanding
- ALLOWED
- Power sanders with a HEPA vacuum attachment
- Open flame or high heat removal Head gun below 1100° F on small projects Paint strippers without Methylene Chloride

 - Contained pressure washing
 - Contained abrasive blasting Wet-scraping or wet-sanding

PLEASE, always wear a respirator while working with lead paint to protect yourself. PLEASE, protect your neighbors home and yards by containing all work you are doing. PLEASE, protect your children and your neighbor's children by following lead-safe practices.



Call your local government offices or private environmental firms and just ask. There are programs out there with money for home improvements for families with children with elevated lead counts.

more recently in the Milwaukee area, Jon and Terri are happy to now call Astor Park home. Terri is a Professor of Political Science at the University of Wisconsin Green Bay and Jon works in Sales and Marketing for CH2M. The couple purchased the home last year and immediately began renovation work, completing most of the more grueling tasks within the first six months. Astor Park neighbors probably first noticed the change in house color, the appearance of the front lawn, and the implementation of a front yard garden gate greeting them as they strolled past last summer. The initial "curb appeal" of the home may have been the most obvious, while inside Terri and Jon went to work gutting and improving the spacious kitchen and upstairs bath, in addition to extensive cleaning and repairing of plaster walls and wood floors throughout the house. The result is a home that reflects the original vision of the architect-remaining mindful of its true historic character—but also one that has been brought into this century.

The Johnson's hard work has not gone unnoticed, and in early March the couple was awarded the Brown County Historical Society 2006 Restoration Award. Jon shared that this award was given to them because of their "maintaining of the original intention of how the house was laid out and used." A wonderful example of this would be the apparent "sun room" of sorts on the left side of the home, where Jon and Terri intentionally kept the original glass windows-a real treasure in the eyes of both the owners and historical society.

The interior of the home has been beautifully decorated in a fashion complementing the more "craftsman" style lines of the home. Heavy curtains once hiding most of the windows and walls have been removed and an array of warm earth-tone colored paint now enhances the inherent charm of the home. Jon reflects that "I think the house was designed for entertaining ... and we do A LOT of entertaining!"
