

Alderman Update

<u>Astor Park Playground</u>: New playground equipment will be installed in Astor Park next year. A group of interested neighbors has met with city park staff to select the play structures.

<u>St. James Band Shell</u>: Neighbors of St. James Park and a representative of the City Band have had several meetings with park staff to consider the design for a new band shell. The park staff will work with an architect to finalize the design.

<u>Mason/Monroe Interchange</u>: The Mason St. off ramp onto S. Monroe Avenue will be reconstructed next summer. Pedestrian crossing of Monroe will also be improved. Plans are in the making to present a neighborhood meeting in August.

Bellin / Neighborhood Landscape Committee: Bellin Health representatives have met with neighbors on several occasions to discuss its renovation project. This has resulted in the formation of a committee of neighbors who will work with Bellin during the landscaping phase of the project.

Aldo Leopold School/Neighborhood Meetings: School district staff members have met with neighbors of Aldo Leopold School to consider options for proposed parking lot and playground changes.

House Kudos

Steve Beerntsen resides with two daughters, Amanda and Allison, in his renovated cottage style house at 1026 S. Clay Street. The house is pre-1900, but Steve is unsure of the exact year that the house was built.



The most apparent change to the house (for those longterm neighbors) is the second story that Steve added to the original one story home. He believes, however, that his is not the first modification

to the house, given several telltale discoveries made during his two-year renovation project.

An attractive brick pathway, laid by Steve, leads to the new porch steps and ancient wrought iron rails, which he purchased from a collector. Immediately inside the front door is a generous foyer with an open staircase to the left and denture crown molding all around. The foyer itself used to be a bedroom and part of the wrap around porch. Most of the original wood floor remains throughout the first floor, which is covered by nine-foot ceilings.

Although the original house was small, it had three bedrooms on the first floor. The renovation converted the bedrooms into a larger living room, a dining room, and the aforementioned foyer. Four bedrooms, a second bathroom, a hallway, and closet space make up the second story. The hallway and master bedroom are floored with hickory, which stretches to meet the oak floor of the staircase. A deck is attached to the back of the second story with access through patio doors from the master bedroom.

At the back left side of the house is a flowercovered arbor and split rail fence through which one enters along a field stone pathway to several gardens and sitting areas in the back yard. At the very back is an inviting field stone patio that sits under the shade of a large tree.

A neighbor, Roger Langlois, assisted Steve with the tasteful wallpapering, gardening, and selection of furniture.

Fox River Trail

On May 26, 2001, the Fox River Trail opened with an official ceremony attended by local and state officials. The northern hub of the trail is at the corner of Adams and Porlier Streets and extends 13.2 miles south to Greenleaf. Approximately one-half of the trail (Green Bay to DePere) is paved.

User volume was originally estimated at 30,000 people for this year. That mark, however, was reached within the first five weeks according to Jim Schmitt. He believes that the trail will realize approximately 150,000 users if the utilization stays on track.

Trail passes are required for bikers and can be purchased at the Brown County Parks Department, 305 E. Walnut Street, on the third floor. You may also purchase passes at:

- Lox Stock & Bagel, 1300 S. Webster Avenue
- Stadium Bike, 1908 E. Mason Street

Daily passes are \$3.00. If you plan on using the trail often, you may want to purchase an annual pass instead for \$10.00, which is good at other state trails including Mountain Bay.

Funbusters Run

You may have heard the rumble that hits the neighborhood on Tuesday evenings around 6:15 p.m. No, it is not the sound of an approaching thunderstorm, although the event is nothing less spectacular. It is the sound of the Funbusters Run, a convoy of (on average) 110 motorcycle riders that gathers at St. Michael's Pub, 1539 Riverside Drive.

Mike Bloomer, the proprietor of St. Michael's Pub, has hosted the event for four years, including this one. The Funbusters Social Club and 106.7, the Eagle, sponsor the ride. Riders are asked to contribute one dollar to the Salvation Army and a canned good to Paul's Pantry as admission to the event.

The riders leave the parking lot around 7:35 p.m. for an approximately sixty mile round trip. Safety, no hot-dogging, operating at reasonable speeds, and obeying the law are stressed. Typical places that serve as the turnaround point are Shoots on B in Howard-Suamico; the Oak Ridge Bar and Grill on 57 near Edgewater Beach; The Rendezvous in Luxemburg; and Mustang Shelly's in Luxemburg. The turnaround establishments are chosen based on their ability to accommodate the riders for refreshments and/or food. More importantly, the establishments treat the riders well. Around 10:30 p.m., the riders pull back into the parking lot at St. Michael's pub.

The run begins during the last week of April and has gone as long as the second week of November. It all depends of course, on the weather. All makes and models of motorcycles are welcome, as well as riders of all ages: the event has a 75 year old operator and has seen a passenger as young as 6.
