House rehab kudos to **Rick** and Gail McNutt of 840 S. Madison, Built in 1874, theirs was the third house built in the Astor neighborhood. Having lived in this house for more than ten years, they enjoy living in the neighborhood and love their house. Unfortunately, with the original fieldstone foundation they had to contend with serious seepage problems in the spring. They considered selling and building new elsewhere, but they love the neighborhood and didn't want to saddle new owners with old problems. "Astor is halfway to everywhere," as Rick likes to say. "Downtown, festivals, food and shopping are all within walking distance."

Their solution was to add a new basement to the existing house. This involved supporting the house while the old foundation was removed and a new one excavated and poured. The house was supported using low-tech materials such as railroad ties and steel I-beams. No computers, lasers, or the like were used. By the completion of the job there had been minimal impact on the pre-existing house. The aboveground portion of the foundation was completed with split-faced block.

The renovation also included rehabilitation of their in-ground pool. Their pool was the first in Green Bay. Built by the Minehan family in 1948, it was open to all children who brought a cup of chlorine bleach, a towel and could show a YMCA card as proof that they were capable swimmers! The McNutts had the pool sandblasted to raw concrete and then re-surfaced and re-plumbed to current code standards. Lights and an automatic pool cover were also added. New tile was installed at the edge and a new deck of stamped concrete was installed, with



each square being hand-colored giving it a natural look and feel.

The pool is architecturally framed by a red brick wall set in an English garden pattern. The wall is extended to its full height by brick columns with wrought iron fencing in between. The wall and columns are capped by sandstone, the fencing with fleur-de-lis. The original wrought iron gate which opened onto the driveway from the pool deck was sandblasted, re-painted and reinstalled.

Lastly, the front yard and pool area were re-landscaped and additions to the red brick walkway leading from the front door to Madison Street were added.

The work took nearly one year to complete. All work was approved by the local historical society prior to the work permit being issued. The additions and renovations have added to the historic feel of the neighborhood.

Astor Park Beautication Project

For families biking in the springtime or couples walking their dog in the winter, the Fox River Trail offers the Astor Neighborhood families many activities to enjoy. The trail plays an integral role not only to the Astor community but also to the greater Green Bay area. The Astor Neighborhood Association (ANA) board has implemented two goals in our strategic plan to maintain this vital asset in our community. First, we continue to have annual Fox River Trail cleanups. Second, and more importantly, we have added the goal of commissioning an innovative work of art to beautify the trail in our neighborhood. The artwork will add aesthetic value to the riverside and will also be one of the trail's main attractions.

On April 1st the ANA was awarded a \$5,000 grant by the Green Bay Neighborhood Leadership Council to begin the project of acquiring and installing a permanent piece of art. The work of art, with additional landscape surrounding the art for gardens, will be located at the corner of Porlier and Adams Streets. The artwork will serve two purposes. First, it will further the ANA's mission statement by maintaining vitality in the community through attracting neighbors, city residents, and tourists to the trail; thus encouraging people to lead a healthier lifestyle by engaging in outdoor activities. Second, a new piece of art will lead visitors to the northern part of the trail to see the other art expeditions along the riverside. The artwork will be funded by the grant and also by private donations raised by the ANA.

We are in need of volunteers to join our committee to find an artist, an artwork piece and to raise funds. The committee will send out a request for proposals to Green Bay artists including those who reside or work within Astor Neighborhood. Having a local artist involved will create enthusiasm within the neighborhood for the project and will promote local art in our community. The Astor Neighborhood's St. James Park has always been considered one of the more beautiful in the city with its historic plantings and mature trees. During the spring and summer months photographers can often be seen photographing the blue Siberian squill that carpets the ground, the magnolia flowers on the trees, or the perennials in the flower beds. The same interest in the flowers can be seen in the beds that have been added to the Fox River Parkway. This developing park in the Astor Neighborhood is located along the Fox River Trail between Porlier and Cass Streets and attracts children as they examine the orange poppies or the towering grasses in the four small beds near the fishing pier and near the benches at the end of Cass Street.



While the flowers beds are beloved, the

city does not take responsibility for them. The Astor Neighborhood Association coordinates the planting, fertilizing and winterizing of the gardens, but needs help removing the weeds. While walking in either of the parks, please feel free to stop for a moment and pull a weed or two. If enough people take that simple step every time they walk by, the weeds will not overwhelm the gardens -- and the city will not cover the plantings in favor of grass.

This is also a terrific way to help the community for those who are looking for a volunteer opportunity for school, a club or church. Two people weeding the flower gardens in both St. James Park and the Fox River Parkway can do the job in about two to three hours – a group could do it more quickly. 

A health and safety concern has been noted on the vacant lots owned by Rebekah Haven on Grignon Street between Jackson and Van Buren. Dog owners in violation of city ordinances have allowed their dogs to roam through this area (sometimes unleashed) and defecate on the property; then fail to promptly remove the messes. Some unleashed dogs have been reported as aggressive toward children and pets that live in the surrounding homes. Nearby neighbors do not appreciate use of these vacant lots as a dog park or so-called "poop park".

City ordinances regulating these issues are listed below. It is unlawful to allow your dog to defecate on another's property without immediately removing the mess... so bring a scooper or bag whenever you walk your dog! Dogs must be controlled whenever within five feet of a public rightaway...so keep your dog on a leash! Those not following these ordinances are subject to up to a \$1,000 fine per incident. Our community police officers have been made aware of this problem



and will be keeping an eye on the situation. Neighbors who become aware of loose and/or aggressive dogs in this area or dog owners failing to immediately remove their pet's waste are encouraged to contact the community police officers at 448-3143. Thank you to all the responsible dog owners who respectfully keep our neighborhood safe and tidy!

8.04 (5) REMOVAL OF ANIMAL WASTE. No person who possesses an animal shall permit such animal to defecate upon any property other than that of its owner or custodian unless the custodian immediately thereafter cleans up and removes such animal excreta from such property.

(6) ACCUMULATION OF ANIMAL WASTE. No person possessing an animal shall permit more than 24 hours accumulation of such animal's manure to remain on property under the possessor's control.

(7) CONTROLLING ANIMALS. No person who possesses an animal shall walk or escort such animal off the property under the possessor's control unless the person is in possession of equipment to clean up any defecation which may be deposited by such animal.
 (8) PENALTIES. Any person who shall violate this section shall forfeit not less than \$1 nor more than \$1,000 for each offense. Each violation of this ordinance shall be considered a separate offense, and any violation continuing more than one day shall be considered a separate offense.

8.06 ANIMALS TO BE CONFINED.

(1) No person, owner, or custodian shall permit any animal to be at large within the City. Any animal shall be deemed to be at large when it is off the premises owned or leased by its owner or custodian unless crated, penned, or under the control of a person able to control the animal by means of a leash of sufficient strength to control the action of the animal, or such other personal attention as will reasonably control the conduct and actions of the animal.

(2) No person, owner, or custodian shall permit any animal to be left unattended within 5' of a public right-of-way.
