How to Slow it Down on S. Monroe Ave?

That seems to be the question when I talk to Astor neighbors about some of the summertime traffic issues. Why do drivers on S. Monroe Avenue feel like they do not have to yield when they can clearly see pedestrians in the crosswalk? The question seems to come up each year we enter the summer season and it continues right up to the first weeks of school. It all comes down to three words..... Right of Way. And unfortunately many motorists feel they have it when they are in their car and you are the one trying to cross the street. The problem is, they're wrong. In fact, 346.24 (1) Wisconsin statutes says so. I know that as you are crossing the street to maybe enjoy a night of Friday on the Fox you are also thinking, "Okay, me having the right of way while

crossing isn't worth me being hit by

a car either".

Yes, I get other traffic complaints too, such as the SUV that occasionally drives through Cass and Adams playing loud music and driving fast. There's another issue about having the cement island extend out to the crosswalk at the intersection of S. Monroe Avenue and Cass Street, so that people crossing have a safe area to stop in the middle of the street to wait for traffic. For some reason the island stops too far short. Of course another is motorcycles with loud pipes. You have probably heard the saying "loud pipes save lives". Well, on that theory according to Captain John Laux GBPD, "Not a single thoughtful study has ever been done that

supports the theory". In fact, CPT Laux goes on to say that "the effects of excessive motorcycle noise on the health and welfare of the general public is well documented by the EPA". He urges officers to step up enforcement of loud pipes.

Through the summer and all year long, there are many opportunities for you to enjoy the cultural, educational, and recreational opportunities offered by the county:

Neville Public Museum – The Neville is celebrating its 100th anniversary, and there are two particularly special exhibits brought to the museum which I recommend. Showing through Labor Day is "**Spies, Traitors, and Saboteurs**," an exhibit brought from the National Spy Museum in Washington, DC. This exhibit features events from throughout America's history and takes a thoughtful look at balancing the civil rights and protecting our citizenry. A pertinent Wisconsin connection is a portion of the van used in the Sterling Hall bombing on the UW-Madison campus 45 years ago. The second major exhibit is "**Extreme Deep**," which shows through the fall, and allows us to visit the most remote and unexplored areas on our planet.

Library – The Children's Garden, which was approved while I was on the Education and Recreation committee, is now completed and fully in bloom. The library is a vital part of our community – last year there were over 2,000,000 items circulated, answered an average of 431 research questions per day, and there were over 175,000 uses of library computers. Additionally, over 85,000 persons attended the 3,000 programs offered in 2014.

Brown County Golf Course – Last summer, the county golf course had all new greens installed; during this time, there were alternate temporary holes established, somewhat limiting play. This update has been quite successful and we recommend that golfers in our community enjoy our fully functional, updated course for their next golf outing.

Zoo and Parks – The Adventure Park next to the NEW Zoo is open for its second season, with a 1000-foot long zip line, climbing tower, and 16 outdoor adventure challenge elements which give families the opportunity to work with ropes, bridges, climbing, and more in a safe environment. Also, please remember to purchase a trail pass when using the Fox River Trail that runs through our neighborhood.

Green Bay City Band

Summer is drawing to a close, and like the end of each season, it means the end of many things we enjoy. This season is a special time, filled with fond memories of grilling, camping, children playing outside, and savoring the sun until late in the evening. As we say goodbye to summer, we also feel the excitement the next season holds. Many of you are likely getting ready for school to start, maybe squeezing in one last family vacation, getting ready to send your child off to college (cheers and tears), or if you're an empty nester, you may be looking forward to the fall quietness of the neighborhood. Regardless of what lies ahead, I wanted to take a moment to relish one of my favorite parts of summer, the Green Bay City Band concerts at St. James Park. They are such a treasure, and we are fortunate to have this within walking distance of our homes. I hope that as this hits your mailboxes, there will be at least one concert left. The last concert is Wednesday, August 19 at 7:30 pm. Please go and take it all in! Look at the people; young children crowded on the playground, families having a picnic before the music starts, people of all ages saving their usual seats on the lawn, and couples attending as they have for decades. It is a beautiful gathering of families and friends, both young and old. A grand tradition we are blessed with, just a short walk from home.

As with all great things, credit is due to certain individuals who selflessly give to make it happen. M.J. Heynen had a vision, and in 1903, he started the "Heynen Band", which later became the Green Bay Concert Band, American Legion Band, and is now known as the Green Bay City Band. The original site of the concerts was Whitney Park. Under the direction of Donald Barber (director from 1959 to 1980), the concerts were relocated to St. James Park. Mr. Otto Kaap, a restaurateur and percussionist with the band, had played an instrumental role in the installation of the carillon at First Lutheran Church, which is just east of the park. The Band used the carillon in conjunction with their concerts. Carillonneurs were brought in from both Europe and the U.S. to present concert pieces with the band. The City Band also did some significant traveling in the 1980s, performing concerts in Poland, China and Hong Kong. The Green Bay City Band has never missed a concert season, not even during the Great War (WWI) or World War II. They kept on playing, and this makes them one of the country's oldest performing community bands.

So, here is a thank you to all the members of the City Band and to those behind the scenes, both past and present; thank you for making music for the past 113 years!

I particularly enjoy the spring garden, and by mid-July I seem to focus on the progress of the tomatoes, etc. but the latter part of the summer does have interesting plants besides veggies: Bee Balm, Brown Eyed Susans - I have both a short and tall version, not truly the same species but the flowers are similar, ornamental grasses like Feather Reed Grass are attractive, Coneflowers, the purple native prairie plant, or the new varieties with spectacular colors. Some daylilies will last through July or beyond, and the Sedum Autumn Joy is nice. For really late season, there are hardy mums and ornamental kale. I am sure there are many others as well.

Aldo Leopold Community School Enters Year Twenty-seven

In 1976, Principal Dr. Margaret Hutchinson started the Howe Elementary Alternative program. She had a vision of starting a school, which eventually became the Aldo Leopold Community School in 1988. The school teaches K4-8th grade and has a student body of 550 students, staffed by 28 full time teachers. Regarding the ethnic background of the school, it prides itself on not only the neighborhood but the city's population as a whole.

The school also has numerous volunteers that play a vital role in its success, consisting of family members, parents, grandparents, community members, and college students. They help with everything from reading to helping out on various recess activities. A unique feature of Aldo Leopold Community school is it is considered a "choice" school, meaning students are welcome to attend from all over, not just the local neighborhood.

Aldo Leopold's Community School's current Principal is Trina Lambert. She will be entering her seventh year at Leopold, her 25th year in education. "It is important to understand we are in this wonderful neighborhood, it truly is a gift," she said. She stated her passion is to take care of and watch over the children's best interests.

In 2014, Aldo Leopold Community School ranked better than 73% of all elementary schools in Wisconsin and ranked first among the 27 elementary schools in the Green Bay Area School District. Out of the 1,039 elementary schools in Wisconsin, Aldo Leopold Community School ranked an impressive 280th.

Aldo Leopold Community School takes total pride in what they call their "Buddy System," in which each student serves as a buddy to another. Older students work with younger students. As the students age, their roles change into being a mentor for a younger student.

Principal Lambert said, "This connection has a positive impact on student to student relationships and is a big reason our graduates return to visit our school year after year."

Aldo Leopold himself was born in Burlington, Iowa on January 11, 1887 and died on April 21, 1948. He was an American author, scientist, ecologist, forester, conservationist, and environmentalist.
